


#### Select which year groups your child/children attend(s): (96 responses)





#### How important do you think are these functions of a Parent Council?

#### A forum for parents to voice concerns (95 responses)




# A group who support parents to understand what's going on in the school (95 responses)






### A group to organise family social events (93 responses)


#### A consultation group to represent the views of all parents (93 responses)

To ensure that young carers hav access to supported studies




#### What would you be interested in finding out more about? (80 responses)
