HEAD TEACHER'S WELCOME

As we come to the end of this term, we not only look back to review what has been achieved, but what our priorities are for next term.

It's been a very busy time as we prepared Senior Phase learners for the prelim examinations which took place before the Christmas holiday this year. This was a very deliberate attempt to provide a clear picture of attainment and progress so far but more importantly to identify how we support those learners to achieve their potential in the months ahead. There will be a tracking report available in January, as well as a Senior Phase parent night, which will identify next steps for improvement and it is important that, even when the examinations have not gone as planned, learners have the resolve and determination to persevere to success. This is when dialogue at home is critical and we would ask for your support in ensuring that all learners make the use of the opportunities available to them in the coming months.

As a result of additional funding from the Pupil Equity Fund, other developments have taken place in supporting our learners as we continue to work with a wide range of partners. Our twitter page provides regular updates and information on initiatives we are undertaking as we undertake to support all of our young people to reach their potential. New developments continue to gather pace including further mentoring programmes, an increase in the number of young people accessing Duke of Edinburgh programmes and alternative curricular pathways.

Over the past few weeks, S3 pupils have been engaging in a number of activities which will help them to make choices for their future pathway in our school. S3 Retreats have taken place to enable a period of reflection with regard to making the correct subject choices as well as profiling of attainment and skills through the Key Adult programme. Pastoral Care and the Senior Team have engaged in 1 to 1 interviews to assist our learners to reflect on their strengths and to identify their aspirations for the future. All S3 learners have been engaging with the PlanIt Plus website (https:// www.planitplus.net) and investigating possible career choices to assist them in their choices for the future. This is something that can be explored further at home as all learners have their own log on details. We would encourage you to continue with these discussions at home in order to ensure that the options process is as smooth as possible.

The season of Advent always brings together the Community of St Mungo's to reflect on the needs of others and this year we have been collecting money to give to the local food bank. Although there is no total at present, there appears to be an improvement in the amount collected last year which was over £900. We are grateful for the generosity and

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support of parents, pupils and staff alike in supporting this very worthy cause.

Finally, Mr Brian Feeney, who was a DHT in St Mungo's for 6 years left us for pastures new at the beginning of December when he took up post as Head Teacher in another North East school in Glasgow, All Saints Secondary. We thank him for his service to our school community over the years and wish him all the very best in his new role. He will be replaced by Mr Gerry Burns who currently is Faculty Head of Science in St Margaret's Academy, Livingston. Mr Burns will take up post in St Mungo's in mid January and I'm sure that he will experience the same warm welcome that all new members of our school community receive when they arrive here.

Thank you for your continued support, thank you for your generosity and on behalf of the whole school community may I wish you a very happy, peaceful and holy Christmas.

Reciprocal Reading

One of the ways we are seeking to improve the reading skills of our young people is through the teaching of specific reading strategies. Reciprocal reading is a group reading strategy in which the young people work together to understand and explore a text. Each person has a specific role that they take on in their group (Predictor, Clarifier, Summariser, and Questioner) and they work with other students to develop and extend their understanding of the text. We are currently using this strategy with our S1 and S2 students in English and will be expanding to other year groups and subjects in the coming months.

How can you help? Encourage your child to read at home. Ask them to make predictions about what will happen next. Have them look up unfamiliar words in the dictionary. Ask them to tell you the main idea of the text they're reading. Encourage them to come up with challenging questions about their reading.

Discussion will be based around looking at ways to promote literacy within the student body from speaking at assemblies to organising literacy initiatives. 

WHAT PUPILS ARE LEARNING

Our BGE ICT students are currently focussing their learning on Computational Thinking and will all be involved in an on -line challenge by @Brebas. Their Computational Thinking Challenge is held in the second week of November and introduces computer science to students. The on-line tasks are designed to enhance logical thinking skills and allow young people to break down tasks into small logical steps. This should have a positive impact on their attainment at Senior phase.

All our Design and Manufacture students have completed the Tea light challenge, where they 'Design and Manufacture a tea light holder which could be mass produced and supplied to a high street store, like John Lewis or M&S'. This involved our young people analysing a problem, building a specification, highlighting factors that influence design and manufacturing / modelling a prototype. Furthermore, staff and students were involved in evaluating and scoring their favourite designs and identifying target markets.

Higher Business Management students and Higher Geography students were involved in an urban planning workshop. In particular, our Business students were learning about the roles and responsibilities that modern businesses have in city and urban planning process. The Higher Business Management Class is coming to the end of the Business Organisation Unit.

Our Technical and ICT departments welcomed our feeder Primary 7 young people. This was a great opportunity to showcase the work we do, and let our primary 7's see what they can expect, in terms of learning and standards, when they come to St Mungo's Academy.


