What is an Added Value Unit?

This is your chance to research and present your findings on a Modern Studies issue of your choice. There is a total of 6 success criteria areas which you must meet.

These are as follows;

- 1.1 Choosing, with support, an appropriate Modern Studies topic or issue for study
- 1.2 Collecting relevant evidence from at least two sources of different types
- 1.3 Organising and using the information collected to address the topic or issue
- 1.4 Drawing on a factual knowledge and understanding to describe and briefly explain some key features of the topic or issue
- 1.5 Apply the skills of either detecting bias and exaggeration or making decisions or drawing conclusions
- 1.6 Presenting their findings about the topic or issue

Over the next few months, you will be aiming to complete these success criteria's on a step by step basis.

TASK 1: TOPIC AND HYPOTHESIS (Suggested completion date; 10th March 2020)

Your first task is to **Choose your topic** THEN you must create a HYPOTHESIS around this.

What is a hypothesis?

A hypothesis is a claim that you can either PROVE or DISPROVE by the end of your research. You should aim to create a STATEMENT that has arguments both for and against e.g. Scotland should be an independent country. Please watch the above video clip in order to give you a better understanding around what a hypothesis is.

TASK 2: Creating your Aims (Suggested Deadline 3rd April)

What are aims?

Aims are the sections of knowledge and understanding that you need in order to prove or disprove your hypothesis. Good aims will make clear links between your hypothesis and the debates around it. You may wish to include some background information relating to your topic. You also may wish to show arguments for and against your chosen hypothesis.

In total you need around 3-4 aims. There should be no more than a total of 4 aims. One of your aims should be based around the publics' opinion on your hypothesis (this is an area that we will cover in later tasks)

Thinking about what you need for aims...



Think about a recipe. When someone writes a recipe, they break down the different areas that will be needed in order for the item to be made correctly. This can include; ingredients, equipment and method. If one section is missed out, then the recipe will not be able to be cooked. Therefore your aims need to cover everything that you will need in order to prove or disprove your hypothesis.

TASK 3: Research (Suggested Deadline 24th April)

Now it is time to start your research. In order to do this effectively you will need to look **at least** two different research methods. This does not mean ONLY look at two, as more methods can be included and will be encouraged. One of these will be a survey, which we will return to later. Other methods which you can choose from include;

- Documentary
- Podcast
- Video Interview
- Newspaper article (Print or Online)
- Website
- Reports (for example a government report)

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TASK 4: Creating a Survey (Suggested Deadline 1st May)

This is something which we have already carried out in class when we did our James Bulger Report and you surveyed people in your class.

You will remember (hopefully!) that when making a survey, there is a FOUR step process. To recap, these four steps are;

- 1. Create the Questions
- 2. Ask the questions
- 3. Tally (count) the results
- 4. Present the results

For this part of the task, we are going to focus on STEP ONE: Creating the Questions

It is important to know which type of people are answering your survey. This is important as you are able to see how balanced or representative your survey is compared to the population (something that we will look at later).

Therefore, it is important to ask people their **AGE and GENDER**.

You should aim to have at least 5 questions in your survey (including age and gender). The other three questions should relate to your topic. For example, whether people agree or disagree with a specific issue, what they think the biggest factor is in causing something etc.

Question Types

There are two different types of questions that you can ask in a survey. An OPEN question and a CLOSED question. But what is the difference?

To summarise...

Closed Questions: Questions where people are given a list of options to choose from and these are the only answers that they can provide. For example:

- Q. What age are you?
 - 1) Under 12
 - 2) 12-17
 - 3) 18-24
 - 4) 25-34

6) 45-54 7) 55-64 8) 65-74 9) 75+
Open Questions: Questions where people are able to type or say their own opinion and are not limited to a specific response set. For example
Question: What do you think is the main reason why people are late for school? Please state your answer in the box provided below.
I think the main reason people are late for school is because they forget to set an alarm at night and so they end up sleeping in.




Alternatively, you can simply give your survey to people on separate pieces of paper to fill out or phone/ask people their answers and note them down. However, please note that this will take longer and there is always the risk of losing your results! If you can access surveymonkey then please make use of this – REMEMBER you can download the app on to your phone!

TASK

Your task once you have got your survey replies (remember aim for a minimum of 10 responses!) your task is to analyse your results and EXPLAIN what you found out. This can be done through separate sentences for each question asked but it can also be done through pie charts or bar graphs. Remember surveymonkey produces these for you so you can also screenshot them and add them in. Do whatever method suits you best. Remember to include your age and gender analysis in here too!

TASK 6: Organising your information under your aims (Suggested deadline 21st May)

Now that you have completed your research you now need to SORT out all the information under your 3-4 aims that you completed earlier.

For example, imagine my topic was on Scottish Independence. Here are three points of information I may have found out. (This is made up so if Scottish Independence is your topic DO NOT copy these facts).

Information

The Scotsman (newspaper) - 'Independence will give Scotland back its oil money'

How the Campaign was Won (Documentary) – 'Scotland will lose a lot of jobs if it becomes independent because a lot of jobs come from England'

Survey – Q: Do you think Scotland should be independent? 64% Yes 25% No 11% Unsure

My aims

- 1. Arguments in favour of Scottish Independence
- 2. Arguments against Scottish Independence
- 3. Public Opinion on Scottish Independence

Organising information under key aims

1. Arguments in favour of Scottish Independence

I found out from the Scotsman newspaper that if Scotland goes independent then this will allow Scotland to become richer as it will get its oil money back.

2. Arguments against Scottish Independence

I found out from the documentary 'How the Campaign was Won' that a reason for Scotland not to go independent is because there is a risk that a lot of jobs that come from England will be lost as a result

3. Public Opinion on Scottish Independence

In my survey I asked people if they thought Scotland should be independent and 64% said yes compared to 11% who said unsure and 25% who said no.

TASK 7: Making a conclusion (Suggested deadline 29th May)

This is the part where you finally prove or disprove your hypothesis. Your decision should be based on the information which you have gathered.

It is important that you give AT LEAST one reason why you came to this conclusion.

Challenger Task:

If you are aiming to do National 5 next year or have been told you should be aiming for National 5 by your teacher, then you should be completing this next task AS WELL as the one above. At National 5 level, you need to make a total of FOUR conclusions, rather than just one. You FIRST conclusion is the same as the one above, stating whether or not you have proved or disproved you hypothesis and giving a reason why.

Your other three conclusions can be done in a few different ways.

 Make a conclusion under each aim e.g. What was the overall public opinion on your issue (what did the majority lean towards?) or what is they key/main/strongest argument for or against your issue. Remember to EXPLAIN how you have come to each conclusion

 You can also make a recommendation (depending on your topic) – e.g. if you said prisons are failing to meet their aims, what do you suggest that they should do in order to help them meet them? TASK
